# **Building Anticipation – Setting the Context**

Discuss the children's experiences with Thanksgiving celebrations.

Do they celebrate this festival? What do they have for dinner? Who comes to their Thanksgiving dinner? Talk about times when everyone in their family eats together.



Introduce the book and guide the children through a book-walk. Before they start reading, focus the children's attention on strategies they can use when they come to an unknown word.

### Discussion – Book Talk

What reading strategy did you use when you came to a difficult word?

Why do we celebrate Thanksgiving? Brainstorm to create a list of things that the children are thankful for. List their ideas on chart paper.

## **Creative Response – Independent Practice**

Children can:

- paint or draw a picture of their Thanksgiving dinner and write a sentence about the picture.
- write a poem using the following frame:

I am thankful for	(e.g., my family).
I am thankful for	(e.g., beautiful flowers)
I am thankful for	(e.g., my friends).
But I am not thankful for _	(e.g., pollution).

 draw pictures of things that they are thankful for on the reproducible master. Under each, complete the sentence "I am thankful for \_\_\_\_\_." with close supervision, make cranberry sauce. In a pot, combine
one cup of fresh cranberries with two tablespoons of sugar and
two tablespoons of orange juice or water. Cook gently for 20
minutes.
